Lift Up Your Gaze

A phrase that has been stirring in my heart for several weeks is: "Lift up your gaze." This phrase appears several times in Scripture—like when God says to Abram, "Lift up your eyes and look from the place where you are" (Genesis 13:14), or when He tells Isaiah, "Lift up your eyes on high and see: who created these?" (Isaiah 40:26).

Whenever God invites us to lift our gaze, it's to shift our perspective—to see not just what's around us, but what God already sees and knows.

When I was younger, my parents often told me to "look up at the beauty around you" while hiking. It's easy to stare at our feet, watching each step for fear of stumbling. While that may be necessary sometimes, constantly looking down develops a kind of short-sightedness. We lose the ability to envision where we're going—or what is possible.

I believe it's time for us, as a parish, to lift our gaze—to look beyond what we currently see and imagine the future that God has in store. A future where great things—even the impossible—can happen in Killyleagh.

Rejuvenation: Where We Are and Where We're Going

A recurring theme in my sermons has been our parish vision. We are now 18 months into a season of rejuvenation—intentionally reviving and implementing strategies for spiritual and communal growth.

While we are financially stable - thanks largely to fundraising and our charity shop - for long-term, holistic sustainability we must return to our core mission: evangelism and discipleship, the very heart of the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19–20).

Earlier this year, I wrote the following to our newly elected Select Vestry:

"As we look prayerfully to the future of Killyleagh Parish, we stand on the threshold of a vital opportunity—a call to reimagine and reinvigorate our church life together. This is more than a strategic task; it is a holy invitation to allow the Holy Spirit to breathe fresh life into our parish, making it a beacon of light, hope, and belonging for all generations..."

We are being called to become a welcoming, multigenerational parish—a spiritual home for all ages. This involves not just renewing our building, but transforming our hearts and mission. We want to become a "third space" in Killyleagh: not just a place of worship, but a place where people come to connect, heal, serve, and grow.

Our Six Strategic Focus Areas

We've identified six key focus areas to guide our rejuvenation journey—each paired with a practical "mini project":

1. Parish Identity and Visibility

- Strengthen branding, signage, and social media so people know who we are and what we offer.
- Share testimonies and transformation stories that invite others into belonging.

2. A Welcoming and Accessible Church Space

- Improve worship accessibility (screens, sound systems, space reordering).
- Create a permanent hospitality area—perhaps removing a few pews for comfortable seating.
- Establish a welcoming culture: welcome packs, followup calls, and mentorship pathways.

3. Family Ministry and Youth Outreach

- Strengthen Kids Church not just for children, but to equip and support parents.
- Use our Youth Club as a vital bridge to engage young families.
- Host family-oriented services, seasonal events, and community fun days.

4. Discipleship and Leadership Development

- Equip lay readers and leaders for pastoral care, mentorship, and evangelism.
- Establish small discipleship groups for prayer, study, and spiritual growth.

- Form a core ministry team focused on prayer and outreach.

5. Evangelism and Courses

- Offer Alpha and other seeker-friendly programs.
- Provide clear next steps for newcomers to grow in faith.

6. Meaningful Worship

- Create worship experiences that resonate with both seekers and seasoned believers.

This is not about "doing church differently"—it's about becoming spiritually renewed, rooted in prayer, and joyfully obedient to Christ.

Mini Projects in Progress

Our Select Vestry is overseeing the following key projects:

- Audio Equipment Upgrade Including a modern loop system for hearing aid users.
- Welcoming Entrances Entry enhancements to ensure inclusive access.
- Hospitality Space Dedicated space for fellowship.
- Outreach Initiatives Support for young parents through the Youth Club and Mums & Tots, including mentoring and parenting workshops.
- Church & Graveyard Tours Self-guided tours with printed or digital historical boards.

- Flooring Improvements – Assessing carpet replacement, repair, or removal.

These are tools, not ends in themselves—they support our core mission of discipleship and outreach.

A Changing World Needs Unchanging Hope

We must acknowledge today's fast-paced world: people are more mobile, more digitally connected, and often more spiritually disconnected. But what hasn't changed is humanity's need for Jesus in their search for meaning.

This year, the bishop has encouraged all parishes to embrace the diocesan theme: "Speak Jesus." This is our opportunity to lift our gaze, speak hope, and proclaim the Good News that "Christ came into the world to save sinners" and "to seek and save the lost."

To that, I add: "Love Killyleagh." Let us love our town through acts of service, compassion, outreach, and presence. Whether it's hosting community events or simply chatting with neighbours—we reflect the love of Jesus when we show up with open hearts.
